Winner's Choice raffle ticket stub will also gain you FREE entry for your family. (see page 8).



Get your soil ready for spring

Kane County Farm Bureau offers soil testing to its members at a discount, a great service to

the farm to make sure your soil is ready for spring planting. Three different tests are available and results are sent by e-mail or mail directly to you.

Why test your soil? Soil in its natural state is rarely fertile enough for the best growth of plants. Usually it is necessary to replenish the earth's store of plant nutrients to obtain the most vigorous lawn, the most abundant and brilliant flowers, the prettiest trees and shrubs and the greatest yield of fresh veggies.

When is the best time to test soil? Proper sampling is important to obtain accurate

results. Samples can be taken any time during warmer months, when soil temperatures are at least 55 degrees. If the soil is too

wet to spade, rototill or hoe, it is generally too wet to take a sample. On the other hand, extremely dry soil should not be sampled either.

How often should I test? Ideally, soil should be tested every 3-5 years, more frequently with intensive use. Try to sample during the same season each time for the best comparison.

Why does Farm Bureau provide this service? Kane County Farm Bureau was founded in 1912 as the Kane County Farm Improvement Association, to help farmers improve their production practices and increase the fertility and productivity of their soil. This program is an extension of that. It helps you take the guess work out of gardening!

Soil test costs

Basic PH Test

\$20 per sample for members, \$30 non-members

This test checks for soil pH, phosphorus, and potassium.

Lawn/Garden Test

\$30 per sample for members, \$40 non-members

This test includes the basic test plus organic matter and recommendations on amount and timing of fertilizer.

Lawn/Garden Plus

\$50 per sample for members, \$60 non-members

This test includes the Lawn & Garden test plus nutrients. iron, zinc, manganese, copper, sulfur and boron. This test also includes recommendations.

DeWitte & Keicher pile up groceries for food pantries well as the food pantries they

It was a cold, but an ideal day for Senator Donald DeWitte and Representative Jeff Keicher to participate in the Kane County Farm Bureau's 18th annual Shopping Spree for food pantries. They braved the cold, raced through the aisles of the Batavia Jewel-Osco, and helped to benefit local food pantries. During their 6-minute dash around the store, the pair collected \$2,229.95 in groceries, purchased by the Kane County Farm Bureau and donated to the Tri-Cities Salvation Army Food Pantry in St. Charles and the Hinckley Area Food Pantry.

Steve Arnold, KCFB Manager, and Wayne Schneider, Chairman of the Kane County Farm Bureau's Government Affairs & Public Policy, began the pre-event announcements. They explained the concept of the Food Check-Out Week and why KCFB sponsors this celebration of food and farming.

"The event is traditionally held during February and is devoted to hunger relief, while teaching consumers how to stretch their grocery dollars with healthy, nutritious food." said Schneider.

"U.S. farmers are the most productive and efficient food producers in the world," said Schneider, "but, while food is affordable in the U.S. when compared to the rest of the world, the shopping spree recog-

nizes the fact that for many people, their resources are stretched to the limit." Each year, the "Challenge" allows

two food pantries to stock their shelves with much needed items. Two dozen local pantries food have benefitted since the event's inception. Arnold

thanked Jewel-Osco Store Director Gus Assistant Store Manager Amanda Battistella for the store's 18 years of support and for hosting the event.

Arnold told the crowd gathered for the event that the Shopping Sprees have raised over \$35,000 for hunger relief and that the Farm Bureau's Harvest for ALL hunger relief effort had contributed the equivalent of 2 million meals to local food pantries since 2009.

KCFB President Joe White of Kaneville introduced the contestants, who were provided with decorated and themed shopping carts. Northern Illinois Food Bank's Tom Hong took over the store's loud speakers, announced the start of the race, added play-by-plays, and counted-down the minutes.

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paign was conceived. "Those who saw opportunity in low commodity prices, including milk," he said, "decided to spur local action to improve the health and welfare of less-fortunate others by providing high-quality dairy proteins to local food pantries, building demand and promoting milk at the same time.'

Dairy farmers and American consumers have witnessed simiconditions, production exceeding consumption in the case of the former and empty cupboards in the case of the latter, in the 1930's. At that time, what we now know as "June Dairy Month" was conceived to promote and stabilize demand for dairy products. The Farm Bureau and its not-for-profit Foundation hope that initiatives like the 10,000 Gallon CHAL-LENGE can help stabilize demand while promoting a worthy community need in restocking local food pantries with protein rich dairy foods.

Unlike the shy, timid charac-

ter of Caspar Milquetoast of the 1930's cartoons, the Farm Bureau's "milk toast" was a bold invitation to the larger community to help spread the word about the hunger relief need and dairy focused solutions, like the 10,000 Gallon CHALLENGE.

The "toast" itself was to good

health, to the 160,000 servings of milk that will be provided by the 10,000 Gallon CHAL-LENGE, and to local dairy farmers – the originators of the farm to table movement, and lastly improve the health to those who benefit from it. Cheers!

... If you have ever tried to dig a dandelion plant out of your sidewalk slabs you will attest to this. It is one of the few plants that can regenerate foliage, even if all of it is cut off. Again, look at your lawn the morning after mowing and count the number of new dandelion flowers. Then just shake your head in wonder. Seeds travel remarkable distances on the wind, and regenerate in just a bit of soil and sunlight. Ever spot a bit of yellow on a rocky ledge? The dandelion flower opens during the day and closes at night. Folklore has it that if the dandelion flower closes during the day, rain is on the way, or if a seeds fall off the head without any wind, cancel your picnic.

Dandelions were brought to the United States from Europe due to their variety of uses.

Dandelion Playdough Recipe

- 1 cup flour
- 1/2 cup salt
- 1 tablespoon cream of tartar
- 1 cup water
- 1 1/2 tablespoons vegetable oil 5-10 dandelion flowers with
- petals pulled out

Dandelions

Instructions:

- Add ingredients into a big pot on medium heat.
- Stir constantly until the playdough becomes a big ball and does not stick to the sides of the pot.
- Place on a plate and flatten out to cool.
- You could add a scent (or color) to this playdough during the "stirring" process, I chose not to for this go-around to keep the focus on the beautiful yellow flowers.

Let the dandelion flourish in your garden and the birds, bees and butterflies will thank you. It is the pollinator's best friend and will proide a valuable source of food, particularly in the early part of spring when bees emerge from hibernation. Each flower is made up of dozens of individual florets, each one packed with juicy pollen and nectar. And when they go to seed, birds such as house sparrows and goldfinches will also enjoy feasting on them.

Did you know?

The botanical name for the dandelion is "Taraxacum officinalis" but it is often called "blowball" because of its efficient round seed head which it holds aloft.

The French named the plant dent de lion. lion's tooth. because of the shape of the leaf.

The blossom of the dandelion is actually a bouquet of about 150-200 flowers set in a solid head.

The sculpturing and ridges on the seed are like the thread of a screw and help drill the seed down into the ground.

Hollow flower stem provides flexibility which enables the flower to bow to adverse conditions rather than break, even when the lawn mowers pass by, the plant can spring right up

Heavy tap root and fact that

plant is perennial are parts of success story.

Ends of stems can be split open and swished in water to make curls. Bracelets can be made by slipping the narrow end of one into another.

Children think if you hold a dandelion under your chin, and if it shows yellow under your chin, that means you like butter.

Dandelions were once an important food source in other cultures.

The flower of the dandelion has more antioxidants than a carrot and more potassium than broccoli or spinach

Minerals: Dandelions contain potassium, calcium, magnesium and phosphorus.

A 2003 study at the University of Regensburg in Germany found that 99.5 percent of dandelion seeds land within 10

Kane County Stormwater Management

The Kane County Stormwater Management Planning Committee released the revisions to the Kane County Stormwater Ordinance for a 30day public review and comment. The revisions aim to incorporate Ordinance language from the Technical Manual, address conflicting language within the Ordinance, make the Ordinance more user friendly, add requirements for water quality/ best management practices, standardize detention triggers, promote redevelopment and provide watershed benefit options that encourage farmland preservation.

the Public Following Hearing, the Stormwater Management Planning Committee will make a recommendation to

the County Board at their April 9, 2019, 4:00 PM meeting. If approved by the County Board at their May meeting, the Ordinance would become effective June 1, 2019, and will be the countywide minimum standard. Developments seeking exemption from the revisions should contact their permitting authority prior to the effective date to determine if they are eligible for an exemption.

Over 300 copies of the Ordinance revisions have been distributed for public review to County Board Members, municipal and village offices, township offices, consulting engineering firms, and interested organizations for review and comment. We encourage you to review these Ordinance revisions and provide your comments.


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based on taste, consistency, aroma, color, and "bite" (spice). When the dust settled, there was a decided winner in each of the five categories.

Bud not such a buddy Super Bowl ad infuriates farmers

The Super Bowl beer advertisement brewed belly aches in my living room full of corn farmers. For a pain-staking 60seconds, we watched Bud Light knights transport an oversized and unwanted barrel marked "corn syrup" in its medievalthemed advertisement. The knights traveled to the Miller Lite castle and then to the Coors Light castle to present the mistaken delivery to its rightful owner.

Their message: Bud Light doesn't brew with corn syrup. The ad directly attacked the smaller brands that do while offending the farmers who grow the grain crop.

Social media exploded with disgruntled farmer football fans. Two weeks later, bartenders in Louisville talked about it during the National Farm Machinery Show. The Commodity Classic national farm event in March served only Coors Light and

Miller Lite at a concert. And the U.S. Secretary of Agriculture even mentioned the commercial during his speech at the event. This disparaging commercial struck more nerves than tariff talk.

No doubt, Bud Light beverages would have lubricated the drain of my kitchen sink on that Super Bowl Sunday, had anyone held the beer brand in hand. I sighed and thought to myself, "What are you doing, Bud Light?" Here agriculture goes again with a misleading and irreversible fear-based marketing tactic detrimental to our industry. The one-minute skit tossed more fuel on the fear fire, insinuating that corn syrup likened its vilified step-sister, high-fructose corn syrup. Different product. Different sugar. And a topic for a different time.

Supposedly, brewing beer requires sugar for the fermenting process, and corn syrup does the job. Bud Light brews with rice, and that works just fine, too. I commend Bud Light for its recent voluntary commitment to ingredient labels, the root of the story here. However, in the beer maker's attempt to differentiate its recipe from rivals, it indicated the competitor's sugar choice as inferior. Interestingly, the parent company uses corn syrup to brew some of its other brands. I guess it

depends which label lingo tantalizes your beer-buying habits.

Fear-based marketing has increased over time, changing the way consumes shop and inadvertently the way American farms operate. Green bean cans state non-GMO, while there's no such thing as a GMO green bean. By federal law, no meat sold contains traces of antibiotic, regardless of what the label states or does not state. Orange juice contains no gluten and popcorn no genetic modification. Yet, those well-placed labels persuade the uninformed consumer to think positively of an omitted (or never present) ingredient.

During that dreadfully long 60-second commercial, the corn syrup barrel kept re-appearing, costing about a million every time it did.
