for those attending to learn about the people and dairy cows behind the nutritious milk and dairy foods we all enjoy," says Andy Lenkaitis, part owner and operator of the dairy farm.

The farm, known as Lenkaitis Holsteins, was purchased by the family in 1983 and began with just five cows. Today, the farm is enjoyed by three generations of the Lenkaitis family and is comprised of 150 head, including 80 milk cows.

The newest barn on the farmstead was built in 2018 and houses two robotic milking units. "On a traditional dairy farm, all of the cows are milked twice or three times a day by people. With robotic milkers, the cows decide when they want to milk," explains Lenkaitis.

Attendees can take a 30minute guided tour of the dairy barn to see the cows being milked by robotic milkers, learn how the farm maintains a clean, comfortable environment for the cows and examine the feed used in their special diets to keep them healthy. "We also have the perfect spot for attendees to see the cows up-close and take a selfie with one," adds Lenkaitis.

Besides the cows, visitors will also see tractors and other equipment used to grow and harvest crops. The Lenkaitis family grows corn, alfalfa, oats and small grains primarily used to feed the animals.

Dairy Technology Showcase–June 28th

The Illinois Milk Producers Association and University of Illinois Extension will host the 8th annual Dairy Technology Showcase Friday, June 28, 2019. The tour will highlight dairy technology and dairy management at Lenkaitis Holsteins Dairy Farm in Kane County near St. Charles.

"These tours provide an excellent opportunity for Illinois dairy farmers and industry representatives to get a look at the latest and greatest dairy technology and management,' said Tasha Bunting, manager, Illinois Milk Producers Association. "The best part is, participants can really talk with dairy farmers who have implemented these systems and learn from one another."

The farm tour will be held at Lenkaitis Holsteins Dairy Farm, owned and operated by Andy and Sarah Lenkaitis along with Albert and Mary Etta Lenkaitis, located at 6N509 Corron Rd., St. Charles, 60175. The Lenkaitis family farm is home to 90 Holstein cows (mostly red and white) housed in a freestall facility. The freestall barn incorporates a modern manure handling system which includes a manure

separator. The separated manure solids are then used as bedding with any extra sold to create an additional revenue stream.

Lenkaitis feed their calves a milk replacer diet which includes starter and hay, prior to weaning, in a recently retrofitted tiestall barn with an automated ventilation system. The family raises their own replacement heifers.

Cows are milked in an automated milking system using two GEA Monobox robotic milkers with an average of more than three milkings per cow each day. The milking herd is currently producing an average of 80 pounds of milk per cow, per day. The modern free stall and GEA robotic milking facility was built in 2017 to maximize technology, milking management, cow comfort, and labor management.

The farm stop will include an organized tour conducted by the Lenkaitis family along with management discussions and a research update session led by Dr. Phil Cardoso, University of Illinois.

June is National Dairy Month! Celebrate this delicious and product diverse month by thanking a dairy farmer. Kane County is home to several dairy farms and nationwide, 99% of dairy farms are family owned.

Dairy cows, on average, drink 30-50 gallons of water and eat 100 pounds of feed daily, which allows them to produce 70 pounds, or 8 gallons of milk per day. Dairy farmers work extremely hard to manage their herd so next time you treat yourself to a glass of milk, a slice of cheese, or an ice cream cone, be sure to thank a dairy farmer!

The Kane County Farm Bureau FOUNDATION will award \$25,000 in tuition assistance in the form of scholarships and internships this year to 20 high school and college students. The Kane County Farm Bureau established the FOUNDATION in 1989 to carry out charitable work in the advancement of agricultural literacy and prepare students for careers in the agriculture industry. Since then it has awarded hundreds of thousands of dollars in college scholarships and internships.

Ten scholarship recipients are not listed below and were profiled in our May issue. They are: Krystine Swanson, President's Scholarship; Catherine Austin and Austin Brockmann, John Buck Memorial Scholarships; Jarret VanAcker, Ruth and Frank Carlson Scholarship; Andrew Gould and Ethan Hoffman, AGCO Parts Division scholarships; Catherine Bend and Kristen Hoffman, AGCO Global Women's Network Scholarships; Erin Kettelkamp, AGCO Parts Platinum Scholarship; Jessica Bowgren, Swanson Memorial Scholarship.

The following students were selected to receive \$1,000 KCFB FOUNDATION Scholarships. Congratulations to these future Ag industry leaders.

Elena Chapa of Maple Park, daughter of Paul Chapa and Angela Stastny, is currently attending Black Hawk East College majoring in Biology. She then hopes to further her education by attending Oklahoma State University, majoring in Animal Science. Her involvement in agriculture started at the young age of 5 when she began taking horseback lessons. Fast forward several years to a greater involvement in the equine industry, 4-H, and FFA. Being a part of these organizations has made her aware of the many careers paths available to her in the Ag industry. She hopes to positively impact the agriculture and agribusiness industries by working with different feed companies to develop new feeds and products for livestock.

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Abigail DeDina, daughter of Gerry and Kelli DeDina of Hampshire, currently attends University of Wisconsin-River Falls and will graduate with a Bachelor's degree in Agriculture Education. Growing up she was exposed to the Ag lifestyle by raising chickens and rabbits and being involved with 4-H county/state fairs. Her professional goals include to work in a high school and to either bring an interest to a program that is not thriving, or to bring an FFA program to a school that does not have one developed yet. Abigail has been an active member of her 4-H group by serving as either the President or the Treasurer over a nine year time span. She has also been an active member of the Association for Women in Agriculture, and Kane County Ambassadors.

Resident of Maple Park, but formerly of Batavia, Monica Zimmerman, is currently a junior at the University of Illinois Urbana-Champaign where she is studying Crop Sciences. Not having grown up on a farm, Monica actively gained knowledge about the agriculture industry by taking on varied internships each summer. Last year she held an agronomy internship at CHS Elburn; where she learned about weed management, soils and insects.

Throughout her multiple internships within the industry she has learned about everything ranging from planting to weeding, harvesting, and even pest management. After graduation, her goal is to work in urban areas to develop urban farms, greenspaces, and community gardens. Developing programs to help combat food insecurity and inner city agriculture education are also areas she wants to focus on.

Genoa-Kingston High School Senior, Nathan Nesler, is well on his way to pursuing his goal of gaining a Bachelor's degree in Agricultural Business. Although he is undecided as to where he will be attending college in the fall he has been accepted to Iowa State, UW-Madison, and University of Iowa. KCFB member classifications

KCFB members fall into 3 main membership classifications as follows:

• MM (Regular Member) for farmers and farmland owners. Those who qualify for Regular member status will only be accepted as Regular Members.

• PM (Professional Member) - for individuals that are employed in farm, food or agriculture related careers and occupations, but their income is not directly from farming.

• A (Associate Member) for those who do not meet the qualifications of Regular or Professional membership.

Individuals (but not entities) who are Regular members, as well as all Professional mem-

bers, have voting privileges and elect Directors to provide governance for the Kane County Farm Bureau. Entities which have farming interests (partnerships, trust, corporations) will only be accepted for membership as Regular members in accordance with KCFB bylaws, but have NO voting privileges.

If you're not familiar with Pillow Pets, they are stuffed chenille toys with Velcro straps that allow them to be changed from a stuffed animal (or tractor, as the case may be) into a decorated pillow.

Those provided by AGCO included tractors in their line-up or history (Oliver, Massey-Ferguson and Challenger) in 18" and 16" sizes and in traditional colors, or for the Massey and Challenger, also in pink. The Pillow Pets normally retail for \$20-25, but AGCO slashed prices to serve the community.

In addition to the estimated 2,000 sold to local AGCO employees and at the KCFB Foundation's Touch-A-Tractor, and a similar number sold to area County Farm Bureaus, the Kane County Farm Bureau stocked hundreds as "membership extras", to incentivize future membership and "PLUS" members, and to help grow the association.

At their May meeting, the Board of Directors approved a "distribution" plan for the Pillow Pets. 

Flag day is a day for all Americans to celebrate and show respect for our flag, its designers and makers. Our flag is representative of our independence and our unity as a nation ... one nation, under God, indivisible. Our flag has a proud and glorious history. It was at the lead of every battle fought by Americans. Many people have died protecting it. It even stands proudly on the surface of the moon. As Americans, we have every right to be proud of our culture, our nation, and our flag. So raise the flag today and every day with pride.

The week of June 14th is considered National Flag Week in the United States and the U.S. President urges Americans, via proclamation, to fly the American flag all week.

Did you know?

- ★ Flag Day is celebrated on June 14th, because that was the day that Congress officially recognized it as the flag of the United States in 1777.
- ★ In 1916, President Woodrow Wilson is recorded as officially setting June 14, as Flag Day. Even with Wilson's act, on a federal level the holiday was not passed by Congress.
- ★ It is believed that the idea of celebrating Flag Day in the United States originated with a Wisconsin teacher, Bernard J. Cigrand, in 1885.
- ★ The 13 stripes on the flag represent the 13 original colonies. The stars stand for the 50 states of our nation.
- The colors of the American flag are symbolic. The red stands for valor and hardiness. Blue stands for justice, perseverance, and vigilance.

White stands for innocence and purity.

- \star The design of the American Flag was not made official until 1912.
- \star The design of the American flag has changed 27 times. The last change was on July 4, 1960 to include the 50th state, Hawaii.
- ★ A 17-year-old student, Robert G. Heft, designed the flag as it appears today.
- ★ Despite the fact that Flag Day is not a federal holiday many places around the United States hold parades and festivals to honor the American flag.
- ★ Suzi Myer's grandson, Colin, was born on Flag Day.
- ★ Fairfield, Washington is home to the oldest continuous Flag Day parade in the United States. The parade has been

An easy treat children can make for Flag Day. Maybe one for each family member for dessert or snack.

Gather a few packages of graham crackers, white frosting, ice


Rules exist for displaying the American Flag.

They include:

- Display the flag from sunrise to sunset - if displayed at night it should be illuminated;
- The flag should never touch the floor or the ground;
- The blue field should be in the upper left hand corner when • displayed on a window or wall;
- When raising the flag it should be done quickly and when lowering it, it should be done ceremoniously.
- When two or more flags are flown on the same pole, the American flag must be at the top
- If the edges become tattered through wear, the flag should
- be repaired or replaced. When a flag is so tattered that it can no longer serve as a symbol of the United States, it should be destroyed in a dignified manner, preferably by burning.



cream sticks, small paper cups, and red white and blue food coloring. Give each child 3 paper cups with a tablespoon of frosting inside each cup. Drop food coloring in each cup - 1 red, 1 blue, 1 white. Give each child an

Easy Flag Day Dessert

Basically, you're going to be making a 9x11 inch cake (9x13 would work too), covering it with white icing and then garnishing it with blueberries and raspberries so it looks like a flag.

Note: There are seven raspberry stripes. The bottom of the blueberry square ends at the fourth stripe from the top.

The type of cake you use can be whatever you prefer - here are a few suggestions.

- White or Chocolate cake mix
- Vanilla icing
- Pint of blueberries and pint of raspberries, washed

Prepare cake according to package directions.

Ice the cake with vanilla icing. Decorate with blueberries and raspberries so it looks like a flag.

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
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Farm Bureau calls for quick resolution on China trade

America's farmers need a swift resolution to the ongoing trade war between the U.S. and China, American Farm Bureau Federation President Zippy Duvall said in a letter to President Trump.

The six-year downturn in farm prices that has produced "near-unprecedented economic uncertainty and hardship" is worsening as a result of Chinese tariffs, he wrote. "U.S. farmers and ranchers now face a third



We appreciate the Trade Aid Package that you authorized in 2018. The aid package helped some farmers and ranchers hold on and gave trade negotiators more time to reach a deal with China. However, time is running out for many in agriculture. I am hearing anecdotal reports of farmers, particularly those who are dealing with planting delays due to weather, deciding not to plant a crop this year because there's just no narket for it

In 2018, U.S. agricultural exports to China declined \$10 billion-about a 50 percent loss. This is a drastic reversal for what had been a growing market. From 2000 through 2017, the value of our agricultural exports to China grew from 2 percent to 16 percent of total U.S. agricultural exports.

The American Farm Bureau Federation supports your efforts to improve trading opportunities for all U.S. industries, including agriculture, and we remain hopeful that the U.S. – China negotiations will come to a successful conclusion soon. We ask that your trade negotiators make a deal as soon as possible to end the tariffs that are slashing our exports, destroying a once-promising market for agriculture, worsening the farm economy, and contributing to high levels of stress and uncertainty for many farm and ranch families and other Americans whose jobs are connected to agricultural production

Mitigation payments can never replace lost markets, but as long as these trade disruptions continue we ask that your Administration provide assistance so farmers and ranchers can continue to farm. Also, while it is nearly impossible to replace a market as large as China's, we ask that your trade negotiators continue their work to expand markets elsewhere, through the new U.S. – Mexico – Canada Agreement and ongoing discussions with Japan, the European

Union and other countries. America's farmers and ranchers depend on growing and stable expor markets. Our agricultural trade surplus previously has been a tremendous success story for the U.S. We hope to return to that success for agriculture and our country

As always, Mr. President, we stand ready to support and assist in your efforts to strengthen our nation and econom




