Now in its 14th year, Farm Bureau's "Lunches to Legislators" program gives farmer-members the opportunity to meet local State Representatives, Senators and Congressmen, along with their staff, in a simple, but effective program to remind them of the importance of the farm and food sector. Through Lunches to Legislators, local Farm Bureau members deliver boxed lunches to local legislative offices and have the opportunity to visit with elected officials and their staff.

Due to the popularity of this legislative program, visits will be made on two dates this year to give more volunteers a chance to participate. On Friday, March 11 and Monday, March 14, Farm Bureau members will take boxed lunches, Farm Bureau policy books and farm and food facts literature to legislators' district offices. Lunches are ordered prior to the visits and picked up by FB members at the Kane County Farm Bureau in St. Charles before everyone heads out for a day of getting to know local legislators, or renewing old relationships.

New faces are always welcome. Help represent KCFB and thousands of your fellow Farm Bureau members. A pre-program briefing will be held for members wishing to participate in the program on the evening of Thursday, March 10 where Farm Bureau legislative priorities and tips for meeting with local public officials will be shared over a light dinner.

Attention Farmers! 'Meet the Buyers' on March 22

Illinois farmers are invited to attend the "Meet the Buyers" event on March 22, 2016. This one-day event will take place at the Northern Illinois Food Bank, 273 Dearborn Court, Geneva, from 9:00 AM to 5:00 PM (Doors open at 8:30 AM).

This event is an opportunity for farmers to meet with buyers one-on-one, and learn what it takes to do business with the grocery and foodservice industries. Buyers interested in sourcing local and regional food will be available to meet with fruit and vegetable farmers as well as farmers providing meats, cheese, dairy products, eggs, artisan products, value-added products, and more. Among the buyers scheduled to appear are Jewel-Osco, Fresh Thyme, Blue Goose Market, Goodness Greenness, Niemann Foods (County Market), Artisan Specialty

Foods, Northern Illinois Food Bank, Testa Produce, Midwest Foods, Get Fresh, Farm Logix, WI Food Hub Co-op and others. The day will include group and one-on-one meetings with buyers, lunch, a produce box packing presentation and tour of Northern Illinois Food Bank's facility.

Event registration fee is \$15 for Farm Bureau members (\$20 for non-members) and includes all event materials and lunch. Due to limited seating, registration must be completed by March 18, 2016. On-site registration, if seating is available, will be \$35.00 per person. On-site registration is first come, first served, and as space allows. Lunch is NOT guaranteed with on-site registration. This is a popular event and space fills up

quickly – online registrations are encouraged.

KCFB Board Meeting

February 4, 2016

The Board of Directors met on February 4 at 7:00pm. All Board members were in attendance and several guests including Charles Coffey, Batavia, who reported on the Illinois Department of Agriculture/Illinois Farm Bureau "Homegrown by Heroes" initiative to assist veterans in establishing farms and marketing farm products; Kenneth Shepro, candidate for Kane County Board Chairman; Mark VanKerkhoff, Director of the Kane County Development & Community Services Department, who reported on the upcoming Beekeeping Open House; and Susie Thompson, Illinois Association FFA Secretary, who provided a presentation to the Board on the recently concluded Illinois Leadership Seminar for State FFA Officers to South Africa.

Directors reported on several topics. Pitstick reported on a Young Farmers/FFA meeting

held at the Northern Illinois Food Bank. Craig Bradley provided a recap on the January 11th celebration at Northern Illinois Food Bank of the 5 millionth serving of milk. KCFB was recognized for its support of the "Milk2MyPlate" program at the celebration. Bill Collins noted that a local group was seeking sponsorship and organizational help to conduct an Open Class or Jackpot Show at the Kane County Fair.

A written report was received from Natasha Lewis about the Illinois Specialty Crop, Agri-tourism & Organic Conference in Springfield. Manager Steve Arnold distributed a "Future of the Organization" interim report from the planning team. Committee Reports were then delivered including a report on and request for assistance at AgDays, to be held on March 15 and 16 at Mooseheart.

The Kane County Farm

Bureau's upcoming programs and meetings were discussed including The Food for Thought Regional advertising committee meeting to be held on Tuesday March 1 at Brookfield Zoo; Illinois Farm Bureau's Leaders to Washington program on March 21-23 (Joe Engel will participate); and ALOT (Agriculture Leaders of Tomorrow) to be held at the Kane County Farm Bureau in both February and March. It was also brought to the Board's attention that the Kane County 4-H Foundation is seeking support for a 2016 Pork Chop Dinner Fundraiser. A motion was approved for the KCFB to be a Gold level sponsor of the fundraiser.

The Board recognized and shared their gratitude towards all contributions from this month's donors to Harvest For ALL: Paul (Griz) Stover, John Van Bogaert, William & Patricia Watson, Michael Kenyon, Wayne Schneider and Karl &

In New Business news, the Board approved acceptance of online electronic membership renewals and a link to complete the transactions to be placed on the Kane County Farm Bureau's website to allow members to renew their Farm Bureau's memberships online.

All consent agenda items were approved. The next scheduled Kane County Board meeting will be March 10 at 7:00 pm., preceded by dinner and a legislative briefing at 6:00 pm.

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The buzz on beekeeping in Kane Co.

Kane County officials recognize the importance of a healthy and robust honey bee population. In response to this interest, the Kane County Planning Cooperative hosted a town hall meeting on Thursday, Feb. 11, to discuss the popularity of beekeeping in residential and urban settings and to look at possible adoption of local ordinances regarding beekeeping.

Over 50 local beekeepers and local government officials attended the meeting, including five County Board members and representatives of three local beekeeping associations, Northern Illinois, Fox Valley and Cook-DuPage, to discuss working together to develop and sustain the bee population.

Local officials and planners expressed interest in reasonable beekeeping regulations that support the bee population while protecting residential neighborhoods. The meeting helped county officials to gather input from individuals experienced in beekeeping, allowed the participants

to discuss the need for more public information about the benefits of bees and began examination of a possible clearinghouse for matching beekeepers with landowners, public and private.

Kane County Farm Bureau will monitor the possible development of a model ordinance for municipalities if or when it works its way through the County Board committee system, beginning with the Agriculture Committee. Members who have comments on the beekeeping and ordinances are encouraged to contact the Farm Bureau or the Kane County Development and Community Services Department.

Backyard Beekeeping is a new class at Heritage Prairie Farm west of Geneva. Heritage Prairie Farm has been harvesting honey for local bee enthusiasts since 2006. Starting this March, they will be offering an interactive two part class. It will take place on Saturday, March 12th and Saturday, March 19th, from noon-4pm. Participants will also be able to purchase a basic start-up eight frame hive at a discount, order 3lb packages of bees delivered to Heritage Prairie Farm for an extra charge, and sign up for a later package installation demonstration in April.

Defensive Driving Class

AG LITERACY CORNER

Spring. Oh SO Close

but Oh what a chill

the trees bend on the hill

Yes, I agree with you, Willow Lawrence. The four seasons we experience in Illinois are beautiful, each in their own right, but somehow winter seems to drag on and on. This year has been such a strange winter, with more rains than snow ... foggy, rainy, dreary and cold. Hasn't been one of my favorite winters, as I actually enjoy shoveling snow in my Polar Bear hat, but this year the hat just hangs there and I get out my umbrella. Somehow that rain just doesn't equate to the beauty of snow for me. So let

Maple syrup days are among the first signs of spring

The trees know spring is coming. The sap is churning underground and ready to make its way up through the maple trees, bringing with it that sweet, sweet flavor that can be magically (through a lengthy process) turned into maple syrup.

Maple syrup can only be produced in certain parts of the U.S. and Canada and only at a certain time of the year, and now is that time.

"In the fall, when the leaves fall off, the tree basically shuts down," said Katie Zaban, manager of Pilcher Park Nature Center in Joliet.

"The sap is stored in the roots during the late fall and the cold winter time. When it's late winter, early spring and we have this temperature change where it's approximately 20 degrees at night and it warms up to approximately 40 degrees during the day, it's almost like a pump where when the sun hits the tree, it's making the sap rise up. When it gets cold at night, the sap runs back down to the roots. We tap into the xylem and the phloem layer ... underneath the bark, and that's basically the

tube that lets the sap run up and down the tree. When we drill the hole into the tree with the spile, which is like a fancy spout, we are pushing that spile right into the xylem and phloem layer. When the sap runs, it goes right down into the spile and into the bucket we have hanging

off of it."

Once they get enough sap - and it takes 40 gallons of sap to make one gallon of syrup (sap has one to two percent sugar and the rest is water) - it's off to the evaporator.

Book of the month



Nutrition

How to read the nutrition label on food



1 Start with the serving information at the top of the label. This will tell you the size of a single serving and the total number of servings per container (package).

2 Next, check total calories per serving. Pay attention to the calories per serving and how many servings you're really consuming if you eat the whole package. If you double the servings you eat, you double the calories and nutrients.

3 Limit these nutrients. AHA recommends limiting these nutrients: Based on a 2,000 calorie diet, no more than 11-13 grams of saturated fat, as little

trans fat as possible, and no more than 1,500 mg of sodium.

4 Get enough of these nutrients. Make sure you get enough of beneficial nutrients such as: dietary fiber, protein, calcium, iron, vitamins and other nutrients you need every day.

5 Quick guide to % Daily Value. The % Daily Value (DV) tells you the percentage of each nutrient in a single serving, in terms of the daily recommended amount, based on a 2000 calorie per day intake.

NOTE: Foods with more than one ingredient must have an ingredient list on the label. Ingredients are listed in descending order by weight. Those in the largest amounts are listed first. This information is particularly helpful to individuals

with food sensitivities, those who wish to avoid pork or shellfish, limit added sugars or people who prefer vegetarian eating.

- The food you eat contains substances called nutrients that provide the energy (fuel) for your body to make new cells, heal, fight illness, grow, play and work.
- Here are the 6 kinds of nutrients that provide your body with what you need to think, play and work properly.
- Proteins are used by the body for growth, and to help build and repair cells. Proteins also help keep muscles, skin, hair, and nails healthy.
- Carbohydrates are the main source of energy for your body. Some carbs like sugar give you quick energy. Other carbs such as starches give longer lasting energy.
- Fats and Oils are used to help the body store vitamins and build tissue to protect important

- organs. Fats are also used by the body as a "backup" fuel system.
- Vitamins are needed to help the body use carbohydrates, fats and proteins and to help its systems function. Many kinds of vitamins are essential to your diet.
- Minerals are used by the body to build new cells and control important body processes.
- Water dissolves some vitamins and helps bring nutrients to the cells in your body. Water also helps you swallow and digest foods, and helps keep your body temperature normal.

- To assemble the sandwiches, place the patties on the whole-wheat buns, and top with the raita, tomato, and spinach leaves.

Really, that's all for a serving? game Let your child go with you to grocery store and purchase their favorite snack, or just get it from the pantry. Be sure it has a nutrition label on it. Let the child read the label to find out the serving size and how many servings in the container/package. Give the child some plastic snack bags and let them count out the pieces in a serving and put them into the bags. (If there are 6 pieces per serving of Tootsie Rolls, each bag would contain 6 Tootsie Rolls. A large bag of Midges contains 9 servings, so your child would have 9 bags of 6 pieces of candy.) Let them eat one serving of the product and store the rest till later. This is a very concrete way to let children know what the serving size really means.

A BALANCED DIET

Val Johnson was a participant in the 2013 Illinois Farm Families Field Mom Program. This is a portion of her blog about her experience after a touring Paul and Donna Jeschke's farm in Mazon, IL. Val now spends her time working for the Kane County Farm Bureau in continuation of her agriculture learning experience.

I wanted to learn more about agriculture. I thought that being a Field Mom could be a way to learn more about pesticides, crop nutrients, and organic foods. The month before my first farm tour I started researching, asking questions, and learning what I could, specifically about GMOs, pesticides, and organic foods. By the day the tour, I was mad at the way the U.S. farmers grew food, disturbed about the lack of GMO labeling on U.S. packaging, and confused about organic foods. I read so much about "dirty" foods in the last week I was hesitant to eat anything in my refrigerator! Then, the day of the tour came, and I wasn't quite sure what I was getting myself into, but I knew I would walk away with some sort of adventure and knowledge to share with my family and friends.

A discussion was led on the bus bound for Paul and Donna Jeschke's corn and soybean farm in Mazon. The farmers

present were very knowledgeable and open to any question we fired at them. After what seemed like a fraction of the time, we arrived near the Jeschkes' farm. We passed by the type of barge that carried phosphate and potash mined in Florida, and then saw newly planted fields that were first showing their rows. After arriving at the Field Mom's corn and soybean acre, an expensive tractor and planter was explained. We took a short walk to the fields and learned from Dr. Brown, Agronomy Manager from GROWMARK, about the corn and bean plants, pests, pesticides and crop nutrients.

Most importantly, I learned that the same people who I thought a few hours before were out to get our family, and myself, are really people like you and I who are trying to make the best use of our country's land using science and technology. I now understand why farmers choose GMO seed over non-GMO seed. I also understand more about pesticides, crop nutrients, and organic foods. Lastly, you still need to wash your organic fruits and vegetables before you eat them. Organic foods can be dirty!

March is here, which means that AgDays are here. This school excursion/field-trip is for any fourth grade classroom in Kane County. Consider coming and helping; all farmers and non-farmers are welcome. Call Suzi at the Farm Bureau to volunteer or for more information. I learn something new every year!

March 19th is the first day of Spring. However, the average last date for a frost in the Chicago-area is at the end of April. Enjoy any warm days, but do not plant outside too soon! Your friends in southern Illinois can plant near the beginning of April; Champaign County can plant around mid-April. This is why your college students may tell you about how lovely the flowers are blooming at school,

while we still have two weeks to wait for blooms.

What do you know about non-GMO food? Did you know that no one has ever gotten sick from eating products containing GMOs? Did you know that extensive, world-wide testing, conducted by many accredited organizations, has found no illness/malady/health problem from them? Science-based learning is necessary to combat all the mis-information that is whispered and published.

For March I thought you might like a recipe for Key Lime Pie. The pie will have specks of green from the grated rind, so you do not need to add coloring to get a little green. However, if you want the dessert to be green, you will have to add a drop or two of food coloring, because limes are only green on the out-

side, the rind.

Frozen Key Lime Pie
9" graham cracker crust
8 oz. cream cheese, softened
1 14-oz. can sweetened condensed milk
1 c. evaporated milk
1/2 c. lime juice (2-3 limes)
1 tsp. grated lime peel = "lime zest"
Whipped cream, if desired

Unwrap the cream cheese and microwave it, uncovered, for 10 seconds to help soften it. Beat the softened cream cheese until smooth. Gradually add the 2 types of milk. Beat until smooth.

Press and roll the limes on counter for a few minutes. This makes them juice more, so you may only need 2 limes. Wash the limes and then grate the rind to get zest. Add the lime juice and zest. Beat on medium for 1 minute. Clean off the beaters and then hand mix the gleanings into the filling.

Pour into the crust. Freeze at least 2 hours or until firm. Let stand at room temperature for 10 to 15 minutes. If desired garnish whole pie or each piece. Serve immediately.

Possible garnish: whipped cream, finely-sliced lime, berries, mint sprigs.



IFB participates in groundbreaking for new ag exhibit in St. Louis

The Saint Louis Science Center broke ground on February 2 for its GROW agriculture exhibit. Illinois and Missouri Farm Bureaus, along with County Farm Bureaus including Kane CFB, along with FB affiliate Prairie Farms Dairy, were recognized for their financial contributions to the project. With special efforts of the Illinois and Missouri Farm Bureaus to help connect the Science Center with the agriculture community, and other agriculture organizations in both states, the Science Center expansion is proceeding.

Major donors from other agriculture commodity groups and agriculture organizations from both states included representatives from 12 Illinois county Farm Bureaus, including Kane County Farm Bureau Manager Steve Arnold. All told, 40 guests from Illinois farm and commodity organizations

attended the event. Illinois Farm Bureau President Rich Guebert emphasized the project's unique ability to help millions of exhibit visitors see beyond the grocery store, and learn about where their food comes from.

The GROW agriculture exhibit is 50,000 square feet and located on the property of the Saint Louis Science Center. The exhibit features zones to help visitors learn about: agriculture, water and weather, plants, modern farming, farm greenhouse work, fermentation, and a DIY farming experience. The six million dollar project is slated to open sometime this summer.

Youth crucial to Farm Bureau success

Evan Hultine, a farmer from Princeton (Bureau County), believes Illinois Farm Bureau Young Leaders can maintain recent success and expand the program this year. And, if anyone knows about boosting participation in Young Leaders, it's Hultine, who last month began his term as the 2015-16 Young Leader State Committee chairman.

Hultine was instrumental in developing a Young Leaders Committee in Bureau County more than five years ago. "We didn't have much of a group at the time, so I got some of my friends and others around the county to get involved (in Young Leaders)," Hultine told FarmWeek. "Now, we've got a good, core group."

Hultine, who was helping his father, Lynn, on the family oper-

ation at the time and also worked off the farm, was interested in expanding his professional network. "In college, Ron Warfield (former IFB President) was one of my professors," Hultine noted. "We talked about the value of Farm Bureau and the networking opportunities and professional development, and it seemed like a good place to start."

"As a young farmer, you don't have all the answers or always know where to go," he continued. "When you can get together and share stories with people (in Young Leaders) in the same situation as you, it makes it easier to figure out."

Other young farmers and ag professionals obviously feel the same way. Young Leaders in

2015 added 92 new members, created three new county programs, and grew Collegiate Farm Bureau membership to 425.

The injection of youth will be critical to the future success of IFB, which celebrates its 100th anniversary this year. "Hopefully, we can continue to build on the growing interest," Hultine said. "The more involvement we get with Young Leaders now will help steer where the organization winds up."

The Young Leader Committee of the Illinois Farm Bureau is made up of voting member representatives under 35 years of age from 18 Districts around the state. The newly named representative from District 1 (Kane, McHenry, Lake and DeKalb counties) is Andy Lenkaitis of St. Charles, a dairy farmer and engineer for GEA Farm Technologies in Naperville.

Young Leaders advised to follow 3 V's—Viable, Valuable and Visible

Matt Rush, a New Mexico farmer and motivational speaker (not to be confused with the former Young Leader chairman who goes by the same name) sees a bright future for American agriculture.

But farmers, particularly young ones, must actively engage with everyone from consumers to elected officials in order to help keep the industry "viable, valuable and visible."

That was a key part of his entertaining, yet motivational, message to a record crowd of more than 500 Illinois Farm Bureau Young Leaders during the YL annual conference in East Peoria.

"You have to be willing to be visible," Rush said. "Most of us are content to just sit on our tractor or horse and do our job. But people want to know who we are, why we do what we do,

and why it affects them."

Evan Hultine, YL chairman from Bureau County, echoed that message. He called on his fellow Young Leaders to get involved in Farm Bureau's FB Act Program, which calls on members to vote and to respond to action requests by contacting elected officials about key ag issues.

"To be visible, we have to be vocal," Hultine said.

Precision conservation management program receives multi-million dollar investment

When making decisions about conservation practices, farmers must weigh financial risks, consider labor availability and cost, and manage time commitments. But the University of Illinois, the Illinois Corn Growers Association, and 30 other partners with agricultural interests have developed a new farmer service program – Precision Conservation Management (PCM) – to help farmers make those decisions. The USDA's Natural Resource Conservation Service (NRCS) recently announced that it will make a significant award to PCM to roll out its services in Illinois, Iowa, and Kentucky over the next five years.

"We're partnering with the Farm Business Farm Management Association (FBFM), agricultural commodity organizations, Heartland

Science and Technology Group, and many others, and using farmers' own data to help them efficiently, effectively, and profitably improve water quality and soil health," says Laura Gentry, Illinois Corn Growers Association director of water quality research and adjunct professor in the Natural Resources and Environmental Sciences department at U of I.

The PCM program has been specifically designed to help farmers meet the voluntary best management practices suggested in the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency's Illinois Nutrient Loss Reduction Strategy, which aims to reduce nitrogen and phosphorus losses (runoff) by 45 percent.

USDA's Under Secretary for Natural Resources and Environment Robert Bonnie traveled to the Bloomington offices of the

Illinois Corn Growers Association to announce the award, which is part of NRCS's Regional Conservation Partnership Program.

Partner commitments of cash and in-kind contributions of more than \$13 million will add substantial value to the NRCS award.

Gentry adds, "PCM was designed to help farmers make good, financially based, conservation decisions. As part of that goal, PCM will assist farmers with participating in NRCS programs and will demonstrate the good stewardship decisions farmers are making to protect our soil and water resources."

Nursing scholarship applications

Applications are now available for nurse practitioner scholarships through the Illinois Farm Bureau® Rural Nurse Practitioner Scholarship Program. There will be five scholarships, worth \$4,000 each, granted this year.

The scholarship program, now in its 24th year, helps encourage and develop the pool of rural health practitioners to help meet primary health care needs in rural Illinois. Students

who receive scholarships agree to practice for two years in an approved rural area in Illinois.

To be eligible for the scholarship, students must be Illinois residents and be a Registered Nurse accepted or enrolled in an accredited Nurse Practitioner Program. Funding is provided by the Rural Illinois Medical Student Assistance Program.
