Pollinator Garden expansion update

An ad-hoc committee of KCFB leaders met in late February with representatives of The Conservation Foundation, Kane-DuPage SWCD and staff from the Kane County Environmental and Water Resources Division. The subject was expansion of the Farm Bureau's 750 sq. ft. Pollinator/ Rain Garden into a larger feature for education and community.

The Pollinator/Rain Garden installed in 2020 was a joint project of the Farm Bureau and the Kane County Environmental and Water Resources Division. In addition to its aesthetic and environmental benefits, the dual purpose (rain garden & pollinator garden) was constructed to remind farmers of their opportunity to install water quality benefits, in lieu of detention, to meet stormwater management requirements for many on-farm development projects. The "in lieu of' provipositive change to the Kane County Stormwater Ordinance, approved by the Kane County Board in 2018.

For 2022, the Farm Bureau has received an Illinois Farm Bureau grant for an expansion of the existing pollinator/rain garden to approximately 5 times it original 750 sq. ft. size. This will allow more space for pollinator plants, the addition of upland prairie and wetland species plants and provide for interpretative signage to help the public understand the benefits of pollinators and what farmers are doing to protect the environment. The expansion will also include a second water quality best management practice, a bio-swale, to reduce erosion from overflow from the Farm Bureau parking lot.

The group discussed additional grant opportunities including a Com Ed Green Region grant application and contributions from the partners mentioned begin as early as our April 8-10

above. They also discussed engineering, design, potential contractors, hardscapes, soil amendments, interpretive signage and plant species. The goal is to add an Illinois shaped garden with walking paths to interpretive

Contractors and additional partners are sought for the 2022 expansion. Needs include engineering and design, site excavation and preparation, soil amendments (sand, silt and compost), tile, hardscapes, plant materials and mulch. Local contractors, landscapers, garden centers and Farm Bureau members are encouraged to support the effort through donations, or to offer their professional services for

Kane County Farm Bureau hopes to offer its members and supporters several opportunities to assist with volunteer planting in the spring/summer of 2022. Weather permitting, layout may

IFB Young Leader Conference attendees



In late January, a small group of KCFB Young Leaders (left to right -Michael Bohlin, Brett Dienst, Wayne Gehrke, Carolyn Gehrke-Brummel, Kelcee Miller, Joseph White and Michael Long) attended the Illinois Farm Bureau Young Leader Conference in East Peoria. The highlight of the weekend was Dr. Temple Grandin, animal behaviorist and autism keynote spokesperson who spoke of her consulting experience in the livestock industry and how different thinkers help us innovate and improve. The weekend also consisted of a variety of workshops categorized by five different tracks

designed to provide something for everyone: on the farm (timely production-based agriculture topics for farmers; agribusiness management (resources to effectively manage and grow a successful business; young professionals (gain personal and professional skills for a successful career); education and engagement (learn the empowerment skills to effectively communicate and advocate the values of agriculture in everyday life); and, on the horizon (understand new and emerging trends, agricultural innovation, research, and technology). Agriculture Committee updates

The County of Kane is unique among Illinois' counties in many ways, not the least of which is in its attention to and support of Agriculture as a desirable land use in planning and zoning. Unlike Illinois' 101 other counties, the County of Kane has a functioning and active Agriculture Committee, that meets each month to educate, inform and when necessary, take action on issues that affect farms, food and the environment.

Nine of the County's 28 Board members meet the 3rd Thursday of each month at 10 at the County Administration Building in Geneva. They hear monthly updates from the Kane County Farm Bureau and Northern Illinois Food Bank as well as County departments including Development and Community Services and Environmental and Water Resources. Various other county departments, businesses and not-for-profits in the farms, food and environment "space' routinely appear before the committee.

Below is a partial report from the February 2022 meeting.

Compeer Financial to Back County Assessment of Local Livestock Market

Kane County was recently awarded a Rural Feasibility Study Grant by Compeer Financial. The \$5,000 award will be matched with County economic development and agriculture program funds to conduct an assessment of the local market for livestock products.

Like smaller, more specialized operators across the country, livestock farmers in Kane County have faced challenges that preceded the pandemic. Moving products to consumers has been exceptionally challenging in a sector that has seen unprecedented consolidation. This has made competing with large, low-margin enterprises on price alone an untenable proposition for many farmers.

The pandemic has only exacerbated those challenges. According to a 2021 Kane County survey, the consumer and supply chain disruptions resulting from the pandemic cost livestock farmers several thousands of dollars in lost contracts. Access to meat processing facilities was cut off for many farmers in the face of plant labor shortages and closures. Multiple farmers reported having to cull a portion of their livestock herd for being unable to reach consumers with their finished products.

Imported products are providing additional market pressures. According to the Pasture Project, 75-80% of grass-fed beef sales in the US consist of imported products.

The grant-funded market assessment will serve two goals. The first will be to help County officials, the Farm Bureau, and others obtain a more complete understanding of the market challenges faced by Kane County's livestock farmers across the supply chain. This input will better enable the County and partners to more effectively channel financial support, training & technical guidance, and other resources to address those hurdles. The second goal of the assessment will be to identify untapped market opportunities in the region for the sale of finished and specialized livestock products. The finished report will provide farm-

Bees & Apiaries

Agriculture The Committee took action on a proposed amendment to the County's Nuisance & Property Maintenance Ordinance regarding the keeping of bees. If approved by the full establish definitions,

prohibit the keeping of nondomestic bees, and establish set-backs and limits on the number of hives on parcels of varying sizes, up to 5 acres in Kane County.

The Ordinance was drafted in cooperation with local beekeepers and reviewed by the Kane County Farm Bureau. It exempts any parcel which is both zoned and primarily used for any agricultural purpose.

Water Quality Sampling

County Kane Resource staff reported on their first year of water quality sampling of drain tiles and ditches at the February Agriculture Committee. The goal of the

farmed areas of the County, then use that information develop practices for Kane County farmers to best reduce nitrogen and phosphorus leaving fields and getting into tiles and ditches.

Due unseasonably dry weather in 2021, the sampling

occurred during low flows. The Water Resource team will start up sampling again in March of 2022 to try and obtain some higher flow samples for comparison. Initial results show large variations in nitrate in the various tiles sampled so additional data will be important to the results. Once the 2022 sampling is complete, the team will be looking at different nutrients comparing the rural to the urban areas of the county and identifying focus areas for potential nutrient management strategies.


The contest is open to all



AG LITERACY CORNER

Hello Kane County!

I don't know about you, but these last few weeks - shoot,

even these past few months have been so busy! The old saying, "Time flies when you're having fun." could not be more true! I cannot believe it's already March! And as you may or may not know, I love to learn, so when opportunities were presented at the beginning of the year I jumped on them. Last month I wrote about my experience and takeaways from the American Farm Bureau Federation Convention in Atlanta. Well this month, I am going to tell you about three more opporattending. Yes, you read that correct. Three!

In the first opportunity I had the pleasure of attending my first Illinois Farm Bureau Young Leader/Young Farmer Conference in East Peoria with a small group of our very own KCFB Young Leaders. I had been looking forward to attending this conference ever since

we received notice back in late fall! Why so eager you may be asking yourself? First was the keynote speaker, Dr. Temple

Grandin. I can remember growing up and my parents and older siblings saying her name periodically in conversation as my sister was going to veterinary school and my older brother was working on Jamie Willrett's beef farm in Malta, Illinois. At the time, I didn't really think much of it until I got older and

realized how much of an inspiration she was in many different fields, but especially in the field of agriculture. It is one thing to read her bio, read her books, and hear stories and it's another to hear her speak in person. One of my biggest takeaways from her keynote speech was quote, "Now when you recognize that different kinds of thinkers have different approaches to problem solving, then you can figure out how to work together in complementary ways." Grandin went onto explain in her speech that we need different thinkers to continue to innovate and encourage us to get kids away from screens and expose them to real-world critical and creative experiences such as courses in schools like art, music, shop classes, and being out in nature. I appreciate her way of thinking because there is no "right" or "wrong" way for children to learn and to critically think, however her view on real-world hands on learning is something I hope schools do not lose sight of in this technology driven world. Another fangirl moment I had during this conference was having the opportunity to actually meet and greet Dr. Temple Grandin during her book signing event! I walked

away with several books for my

siblings and one of my own, all

personally signed by the one

and only Dr. Temple Grandin.

was full of education workshops to attend and of the four I attended, my favorite was the workshop all about navigating change. In the workshop, we did an exercise in which we stood face to face with a random partner and were not supposed to exchange any words, only to stand quietly and observe them head to toe for a full minute. (You want to talk about an awkward moment, stand and stare at someone for a full on minute while they are staring right back at you without any words being exchanged!) Then we got 30 seconds to turn back to back and change seven things about our appearance and then turn back to our partner and have our partner point out the changes we made to our appearance. We repeated this exercise serval times and at the conclusion we

shared our experiences of how awkward and hard it was as we were not prepared to change our appearance - very similar to how change happens in our own lives. We may not always see it coming or necessarily be prepared. The relevance of the exercise was to illustrate that change can be awkward and hard to navigate at first, that it is okay to ask for help from our neighbors/friends, and that when we learn to execute 80% of the time, when the 20% occurs in our lives we are able to handle it and be prepared.

My next opportunity was and will continue to be for the next month, participating in Illinois Farm Bureau's Agricultural Leaders of Tomorrow (ALOT) leadership program. I'm about halfway through this eight-week (continued on page 6)

Plastic bottle pig plant pot

Materials

Large plastic bottle Acrylic paint (pink, white) Felt Googly eyes Marker

Marker Glue gun (or PVA glue) Scissors

Directions:

Draw a line around the bottle, approximately 6" from the bottom (this will be how tall your pig plant pot is) and make sure to draw two triangular shapes on the line for the pig's ears

Mix the pink and white paint together until you have a shade of pink to your liking, then paint the whole outside of the plastic bottle. Set aside to dry.

Cut an oval shape and two triangles out of the pink felt to make the nose and inner ears. Then cut two small ovals out of

the black felt for the pig's nostrils and glue the black shapes onto the pink oval.

Finally, glue the nose, eyes, and inner ears onto the pig. Color the feet with paint or marker

Ag Day celebrates impact of family-dominated industry

Some families gather only for the major holidays. I work every day with the people who raised me.

Dad and I pair as a combineand-cart duo for 14-hour days during harvest. In the off-season, Mom and I work from facing desks, handling bills and agency reporting requirements as a team. I communicate with my brother daily, together managing the details of running our crop and livestock farm, one of 71,000 such farms in Illinois.

An overwhelming 96% of Illinois farms are family owned and operated, a statistic worth recognizing in this season that honors National Ag Day on March 22 of 2022. That means families, not corporations, make most decisions about how food, feed and fuel are grown. Those farming partners represent anv combination of spouses, siblings, cousins, fathers, mothers, sons, daughters and even in-laws and grandpar-

dpa helped with harvest until he was 85. I soaked in those after-school moments when four generations of our family worked together in the same field.

We plant fields, harvest crops and manage books as a family with critical support from local employees who feel like family. We seek guidance from a variety of industry professionals - including my husband's precision farming expertise - to improve the farm's economic and environmental viability. We shop local for fertilizer, seed, pesticides, insurances, tractors, trucks and fuel, adding to the collective efforts to support the local community and provide a financial livelihood for multiple households within it.

By nature, farmers problemsolve on and off the farm with the passionate intent to make a difference. In rural towns across Illinois, farmers serve as Sunday School teachers, 4-H leaders, sports coaches, school volunteers and FFA supporters. Farm shops host community gatherings, and farmers pool their unique resources to meet needs. A few years ago, farm families in our community provided the equipment and skilled labor necessary to erect a park playground, a volunteer effort that even the governor recognized and awarded.

The value and impact of Illinois agriculture extends beyond the state and even nation's borders. Blessed with a navigable river system, Illinois ranks third nationally in the export of agricultural commodities, providing feed, food and fuel around the globe from farms owned and operated by families - families like ours who work together and gather around the table for Easter dinner, too.




