### Pollinator/Rain Garden

Representatives from the County of Kane Environmental & Water Resources Division The Conservation Foundation met recently with to evaluate Pollinator/Rain Garden planted by KCFB volunteers in July of 2020, and to discuss next steps for this public demonstration of an environmental best management practice to improve water quality.

Mid-summer planting in 2020 combined with weather extremes including flooding from the rains associated with the August 10, 2020 derecho, followed by a month of hot, dry weather, affected the establishment of at least two plant species, Butterfly Milkweed and Purple Coneflower. Blackeyed Susans, Prairie Dropseed and Little Bluestem, however, showed promising improvement in the year after planting.

The group discussed several alternatives. Weather and availability of plant materials permitting, an attempt will be made in October to fill in the "holes" in the garden in order to get it well established before winter arrives. If you'd like to help out, call KCFB at 630-584-8660 and we will notify you of the planting date(s).

The group also discussed expansion of the project, and means to slow the speed of runoff and direct the flow that comes from the parking lot before settling in the lower portion of the rain garden. They were the bane of your great-grandfather's existence, the innumerable field stones overturned by horses pulling plows across the rural landscape. Hand dug and carried by hand, on carts or sleds to field entrances where they would be piled, so as to not interfere with tillage or haying operations. Many still remain on farms in the area. Mounds now grown over with grasses mark where stones were piled 100 or more years ago.

Now, Kane County Farm Bureau desires to have some of these one-time "nuisances". Our aim is to build a water flow control structure, 600 or more square feet in area, lined with field stones to dissipate the energy of water rushing off our parking lot and headed toward a pollinator/rain garden before (continued on page 2)



Field stones the size of softballs to basketballs and 2-3" thick river stones/limestone are being sought by the KCFB to expand a water quality "best management practices" demonstration project on the Farm Bureau lawn along Randall Road in St. Charles. ### IFB releases Pollinator Habitat Guide

In an effort to address the growing interest, questions and requests for information concerning pollinators, Illinois Farm Bureau has been expanding pollinator resources and efforts. Included in this was a September 1 announcement of a new Pollinator Conservation Grant program available to County Farm Bureaus. Kane CFB will be applying to IFB for a grant to assist with the expansion of a pollinator/rain garden planted at the Farm Bureau in July 2020. We also encourage members to reach out with ideas for similar projects.

KCFB also has, courtesy of IFB, a limited number of Pollinator Habitat Guides for Agricultural Landscapes. This guidebook was created to help farmers and landowners who are interested in implementing larger plots of pollinator habitat. exiting through the storm sewer. Field stones are sought from softball to basketball sized, delivered to our office on Randall Road or, give us a call and let us know where we can pick them up! (Use of a loader tractor most appreciated.) We are also seeking limestone or flat river-stone in sizes that are moveable by hand to create walking paths through the new garden as it is developed.

As proposed, the area will drain across an Illinois shaped "garden" that incorporates the current pollinator/rain garden installed in 2020. The larger size will allow for more plants and environments, to include wetland, pollinator and prairie species. It would likely be built

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### IL announces 1st Homegrown By Heroes Farmer Veteran of the Year


As part of the Ag Breakfast at the Illinois State Fair, Anthony (Tony) Pferschy of Garlic Breath Farm in Kane County was awarded the Homegrown by Hero Farmer Veteran of the Year in Illinois.

Nominated by the Farmer Veteran Coalition of Illinois, Tony is the first Illinois farmer veteran to receive this award.

Like many farmer veterans, Tony, who did not grow up farming, found himself farming for the first time in his life after his service. In 2015 Tony and his wife, Sharon, opened Garlic Breath Farm, a USDA Certified Organic Farm that specializes in garlic varieties that contain higher levels of allicin (the chemical responsible for garlic's anti-cancer benefits). Although Tony and Sharon originally purchased the farm to experiment with crops and find a home for their pet pig, Kevin Bacon, Tony has, over the last 7 years, become a true farmer at heart.

Tony's kindness, humility

and passion for farming shines through for anyone that meets him. In Tony's farming, he works to discover innovative

### **Kane County farm customers** find garlic power appealing

Tony and Sharon Pferschy, owners of Garlic Breath Farm, find customers appreciate their fragrant, flavorful crop. In fact, customers appreciated this year's crop so much, the Kane County farmers are sold out, except for garlic hot sauces.

In a couple of weeks, the Pferschys will start their 2021 farming season by planting 30,000 to 35,000 organic garlic bulbs. Tony farms full time. Sharon farms and works with Federal Aviation Administration as a program manager. Visit the Garlic Breath Farm online and follow them on Facebook.

Garlic Breath Farm, near Elburn, grows three varieties of certified organic hardneck garlic: porcelain music, Georgian fire and Romanian red, known for high levels of allicin. Allicin

GOODWIN

is an antibacterial, antimicrobial and anticancer component in garlic.

The growers start harvesting and selling garlic scapes, the flowering part, in June and fresh garlic in July. This year, Garlic Breath Farm sold its products online and at the Batavia Farmer's Market and the Oswego Country Market.

When the pandemic hit and markets were cancelled at the start of the Pferschys' busy season, the couple pivoted their attention to online sales, which "picked up the slack," Sharon

Then, the farmer's markets reopened, and Garlic Breath Farm's sales took off "like gangbuster," Sharon continued. "Everyone went back to the basics. ... Meet your farmer if you can."

To follow market guidelines, Sharon handled the money, while Tony sold the products. "When someone wants an edu-

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cation (about garlic), they talk to Tony," she noted.

But sampling, a main marketing tool that had doubled sales, were eliminated due to COVID restrictions.

"We thought, 'We're toast. How will we help people understand?" Sharon remembered. "In general, they (customers) didn't care. They tried it, and they came back."

A few years ago, the farmer's market led to Garlic Breath Farm's collaboration with Gindo's Hot Sauce of Batavia, a farmer's market "neighbor." The two entrepreneurs developed a line of hot sauces made with garlic.

This year, Garlic Breath Farm successfully launched two new products: a Garlic Breath Cancer Care Kit, a subscriptionbased service, and a Garlic Breath Cold Care Kit. Both products sold out. However, the opening of an on-farm store will have to wait until next year.

Although the pandemic has been a dark time, "I've seen a lot of good," Sharon said. She mentioned families spending time together and people cooking meals at home. The Pferschys' sales were so strong, they've had to turn away regular customers used to buying their garlic in October.

Both growers remain confident that consumers' interest in local food will continue into the





# Local farmer shares thoughts about zozi harvest

Kane County Farm Bureau spoke recently to local farmer and board member Chris Collins about the 2021 harvest season. Chris has been farming "all his life" and

had some cogent comments about this year's harvest season, which started for him the third week in September.


Chris farms around 325 acres of corn and soybeans in Elburn, St. Charles and Wasco. He said that amounts to about 30 semi loads of corn and 8-10 loads of soybeans.

He calls himself a part-time farmer, having recently retired from a career with IDOT. He enjoys farming and particularly likes harvest – running the combine and harvesting the fruits of his labors makes him feel proud. When asked how the harvest season has changed since he started farming, he responded

that it has "Evolved along with everything else and is now faster paced and more efficient. We used to run small grain wagons from the fields; now trucks and

semis haul tons of grain to the local coop for processing.
That means slow moving vehicles are not on the road as much, but drivers are still impatient with farm equipment."

Chris promotes safety during the harvest season, putting notice signs along the



Chris thinks this year's harvest will be pretty good and that a lower yield due to drought in June will be offset by higher grain prices.

- 1 medium red onion, chopped 1 medium bell pepper, chopped
- 4 garlic cloves, minced
- 1 (6oz) can tomato paste
- 1 Tbsp. chili powder
- 1 tsp. ground cumin
- 1 can (15 oz.) black beans, rinsed & drained
- 2 cans (14½ oz. each) diced tomatoes
- 1 can (15 oz.) tomato sauce 2 cups water
- 1 butternut squash, peeled & cubed (bite size)
- 2 Tbsp. apple cider vinegar Salt & pepper, to taste

#### Directions:

In a Dutch oven, cook ground beef or turkey, onion, and bell pepper until meat is browned





and onion and peppers are tender. Add salt and pepper to taste.

Next, add and stir the garlic, tomato paste, chili powder, and ground cumin together. Then add the beans, tomatoes, tomato paste, and water. Bring to a boil, then reduce heat.

Add the cubed butternut squash and simmer. Keep covered for about 25-30 minutes until squash is tender.

Stir in vinegar and serve!

- 7. Once the paint dries, thread a strand of yarn, hang, and admire!

#### Grain bins a harvest sweet spot

At nearly 4 years old, our son's Christmas wish list included grain storage bins and a "wiggle tractor." (His description for a tractor that articulates in the middle). He found toy versions of both under the tree.

For most of 60 days leading up to forming this list, our toddler watched my family hard at harvest. We transferred crops from

combine to a wiggle tractor pulling a grain cart. That tractor with cart then unloaded onto a truck, which hauled the crop to corrugated steel storage bins. The cycle repeated field by field until we completed the corn and soybean harvest. In the process, he identified two primary hubs of activity: the field at harvest and the grain storage bins where we haul the crop. He wanted part of each for Christmas.

Generally, grain bins garner less attention than combines and tractors, but he knew this necessary component holds the harvest. Farmers either own the steel storage structures themselves or pay for space at a nearby elevator in the grain storage business. Many store in a combination of both. Our toddler saw the value in owning his own bins without understanding anything about shrink or carry in the market. My husband screwed those toy bins to a

piece of plywood. Our son quickly filled them with handfuls of corn to later sell and deliver to ethanol plants and river terminals with 1/64thscale trucks.

In the full-size world, those bins come with the responsibility to keep grain in quality condition, a task aided by observation and modern technology. Sensors measure the moisture content of a crop to determine the amount of mechanical drying needed before storage. Temperature cables alert of hot spots in stored grain to prevent spoilage. Smartphones and tablets can monitor and even control these activities remotely.

This fall, our daughter will keep FFA records on her time and experiences weighing trucks, taking grain moisture samples and creating delivery tickets to track inventory at our farm's grain storage facility. Between loads, she manages homework from inside the scale house, a building with the scale's digital display. Occasionally, the truckers step inside for drinks and snacks, which may include her homebaked cupcakes or cookies from her cottage food business The Bakery Bin, another of her FFA projects. Her bakery logo depicts three grain bins topped with frosting, denoting a harvest-time sweet spot in more ways than one.

### How does a combine work?

Combines are a common sight during the harvest season.

Could you imagine harvesting all the corn in Kane County by hand, then shelling each ear individually to collect the grain? Truly a revolutionary machine! See how it works: https:// youtu.be/F93u851FdYk.

#### **Harvest Terminology:**

**Harvest** – The season when ripened crops are gathered; a crop or yield of one growing

Combine - A machine designed to efficiently harvest a variety of grain crops, the name derives from the machine combining three separate harvesting operations—reaping, threshing, and winnowing-into a single

**Bushel** – A measurement of capacity or size pertaining to agriculture crops. One bushel of wheat is equal to 60 lbs., one bushel of soybeans is equal to 60 lbs., and one bushel of corn is equal to 56 lbs.


Acre - A unit of land area measuring 43,560 square feet. This unit of measurement is believed to originate from the amount of land one person could work in a single day with a yoke of oxen and a wooden plow.

**Yield** – The amount of a crop produced in each time or from a given place.

**Drying** – The phase of the post-harvest system where the harvested grain is rapidly dried until it reaches the optimal moisture level for storage.

#### **How A Combine Works**

During harvest season, combine harvesters can be found all over Illinois fields. This machine has changed the farming industry by combining several steps in the harvesting process – reaping, threshing. and winnowing – into one revolutionary machine. But how do they work



### Tax proposals put future of American farms at risk

The American Farm Bureau Federation, along with 46 state Farm Bureaus and 280 organizations representing family-owned agribusinesses, sent a letter recently to congressional leaders urging them to leave important tax policies in place as they draft legislation implementing President Biden's "Build Back Better" agenda. The letter addresses four key tax provisions that make it possible for farmers and ranchers to survive and pass their businesses on to the next generation: estate taxes, stepped-up basis, 199A small business deduction and likekind exchanges.

"The policies Congress enacts now will determine agricultural producers' ability to

secure affordable land to start or expand their operations," the letter states. "Regardless of whether a business has already been passed down through multiple generations or is just starting out, the key to their longevity is a continued ability to transition when a family member or business partner dies. For this reason, we firmly believe the current federal estate tax code provisions must be maintained."

These tools are as crucial as ever as the number of farmers and ranchers 65 and older outnumber those 35 and under by a four-to-one margin. More than 370 million acres are expected to change hands in the next two decades.

"As the economic backbone

of nearly every county and rural community across the U.S., the importance of American agriculture and related industries cannot be overlooked," the letter continues. "Farmers, ranchers, and family-owned agribusiness operators are responsible for producing the safe, affordable, and abundant food, fiber, and fuel supplies Americans enjoy every day. As the stewards of nearly 900 million acres of crop and rangeland, farmers and ranchers play an important role in terms of natural resource and land conservation. For agricultural producers, carrying on the legacy of our predecessors and setting the next generation up for success is critically important."



## Water testing offered in October

The Kane County Farm Bureau and Kane/DuPage Soil and Water Conservation District will offer water testing in October this year. A high quality water supply is vital for families, and well testing helps provide peace of mind and identifies potential problem areas for homeowners in Kane County.

The well testing program has three simple steps: (1) pick up and pay for a water test kit at Kane County Farm Bureau between Monday, Oct. 18-Friday, October 29, (2) at home, collect a water sample as close as possible to turning it in; and (3) return the water sample to KCFB or Kane/DuPage Soil & Water Conservation District on Monday, Nov. 1st. Results will

be mailed to your home.

Two kits are available and prices vary:

### A. Basic Package (Nitrate Package)—\$45.00

Test for nitrate, nitrite, ammonia, chloride, sulfate, soluble phosphorus, silica and specific conductivity.

#### B. Metals — \$95.00

Test for 23 different metals. All kits include detailed sampling instructions. KCFB or Kane/DuPage Soil and Water Conservation District can provide additional information about each test.

The certified lab at Heidelburg College Water Quality Laboratory in Tiffin, OH tests all samples. The lab is nationally recognized for its work testing rivers and lakes.




# Road safety hinges on patience, good judgement

Along with combines in the fields, tractors, grain carts and trucks are a familiar sight on rural Kane County roads during fall harvest. Sometimes the trucks may be loaded on the road-side. Equipment used in farm fields is generally equipped with tracks or flotation tires to reduce soil compaction and allow operations in less than ideal conditions. Trucks, designed for road use, are not similarly equipped. Loading them in wet fields generally results in them getting stuck and/or bringing mud on the roads.

Kane County Farm Bureau urges all drivers on rural roads to SLOW DOWN during this harvest season. If you see farm equipment, flashing lights or Slow Moving Vehicle emblems on the road please exercise CAUTION and let's let everyone work safe and arrive safely!

There is much to improve in road safety. The federal government updated its report Federal Highway Traffic Safety Policies: Impacts and Opportunities in July 2019. It explained "the vast majority of crashes are due to driver behaviors... , and these are errors of judgment rather than of ignorance or lack of skill." The report gave a common statistic: "as many as 90% of road deaths are due at least in part to driver error or misbehavior." The same report cited motor vehicle crashes as a leading cause of death for Americans overall, and the number one cause of death for teenagers. It also said "motor vehicle crashes are estimated to have cost some \$242 billion in 2010 in lost productivity, medical costs, legal costs, property damage, and time lost in congestion caused by crashes." Last, data showed Illinois residents in rural areas are more likely to die in car crashes than residents in urban areas.
