County proposes text amendments for farms and local food businesses

The Kane County Development & Community Services Department is working to advance the Kane County Board's "Growing for Kane Program" by proposing text amendments to the Kane County Zoning Ordinance. The proposed amendments are intended to be responsive to the changing needs of farmers and local food businesses in Kane County and to streamline administrative approvals for permits.

The proposed amendments will provide several new definitions that address the County's growing agritourism industry. The goals of the amendments are to make it easier for local

growers to sell their products directly to consumers as well as for consumers to access healthy food products and share in the farm experience through direct sales, activities, entertainment and events.

Kane County has seen an increase in proposed agricultural venues integrated with working farms. By creating new definitions and listing them in the appropriate zoning districts, the amendments will provide farmers and policy makers with clear paths for evaluating and potentially approving these uses where appropriate in the agricultural and other areas. The draft amendments will also explicitly allow certain less

intensive agritourism uses as permitted uses, thereby only requiring a permit to safely establish the use rather than going through a rezoning process.

Rain garden redux

KCFB staff and volunteers invited members and the community to assist in the expansion of a pollinator – rain garden in late August and early September to transform this space on the lawn from an 18' x 35' oval into a 60' x 100' Illinois shaped garden. KCFB Directors got a preview of the expansion plans at their August Board of Directors meeting where they posed on the lawn to invite the community to assist in the replanting and expansion.

The Illinois Prairie Pollinator Rain Garden, as designed by Encap Inc., will drain water from the KCFB parking lot through channels shaped like the Fox, Des Plaines, Illinois and Mississippi Rivers to a rain garden at the lower end for treatment. The rivers will double as walking paths to interpretative signage. Overflow will enter the roadside surface drainage across a berm on what would be the mid-Mississippi and lower Ohio Rivers in the design.

With over 800 plants to put in the ground, depending on when this issue of the Kane County Farmer reaches your mailbox,



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Test your well in October! Private well test kits available Oct. 17-28

The Kane County Farm Bureau and Kane/DuPage Soil and Water Conservation District offer water testing in October this year. A high quality water supply is vital for families, and well testing helps provide peace of mind and identifies potential problem areas for homeowners of Kane County.

The well testing program has three simple steps: (1) pick up and pay for a water test kit at Kane County Farm Bureau between Monday, Oct. 17, and Friday, Oct. 28; (2) at home, collect a water sample as close

as possible to turning it in; and (3) return the water sample to KCFB or Kane/DuPage Soil & Water Conservation District on Monday, October 31. Results will be mailed to your home.

Three kits are available and prices vary:

A. Basic Package (Nitrate Package) – \$45.00

Test for nitrate, nitrite, ammonia, chloride, sulfate, soluble phosphorus, silica and specific conductivity.

C. Metals – \$95.00

Test for 23 different metals.

All kits include detailed sampling instructions. KCFB or Kane/DuPage Soil and Water Conservation District can provide additional information about each test.

The certified lab at Heidelberg College Water Quality Laboratory in Tiffin, OH tests all samples. The lab is nationally recognized for its work testing rivers and lakes.

Anhydrous ammonia certified grower training available

Are you a grower who works with anhydrous ammonia on the farm in Illinois?

Illinois growers or grower farm operators who transport or apply anhydrous ammonia, or maintain anhydrous ammonia equipment, are required to participate in a free 'Certified Grower Training,' approved by the Illinois Department of Agriculture. The requirement applies to growers, as well as all grower family members, full-time and part-time hired help, and anyone else providing anhydrous ammonia services at no

fee who would transport or apply anhydrous ammonia, or maintain the equipment. Ongoing training opportunities are being offered for growers and grower farm operators. Certification is valid for three years after being initially certified.

The training covers properties of ammonia, safe operating practices, what to do if a leak or emergency occurs, personal protective equipment and first aid, and transportation safety.

The Illinois Department of Agriculture worked closely with

the Illinois Farm Bureau, Illinois Fertilizer and Chemical Association, Illinois Corn Growers Association, and the Illinois Soybean Association to develop the module.

This training platform provides a reliable source for information and continuing education to keep farmers and citizens safe.



Among seven trees planted at the Kane County Farm Bureau in August, a White Oak was put on the front lawn near the building's entrance. The tree was planted in honor of John White Jr. of Elburn, who served as Kane County Farm Bureau President from 1968-73 before going on to serve as Illinois Farm Bureau Vice-President from 1973-83 and Illinois Farm Bureau President from 1983-93. In the picture above, a hole is dug to place the 12' tall tree, at right is the tree in front of the building with a low hanging branch arcing gracefully toward the flagpole.

White is shown in a photo from the era when he served as KCFB President, from its place on the wall of the Board/Conference Room at KCFB. It and 48 others like it honor the 49 farmers who have led the Kane County Farm Bureau in the past 110 years.

History

The 2019 data for the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics indicates that the agricultural sector is still the most dangerous in

America with 573 fatalities, or an equivalent of 23.1 deaths per 100,000 workers. Fall harvest time can be one of the busiest and most dangerous seasons of the year for the agriculture industry. For this reason, the third week of September has been recognized as National Farm Safety and Health Week. This annual promotion initiated by the National Safety Council has been proclaimed as such by each sitting U.S. President since Franklin D. Roosevelt in 1944. National Farm Safety and Health Week is led by the National Education Center for Agricultural Safety (NECAS), the agricultural partner of the National Safety Council.

September is here and that can only mean one thing – kids are back in school! For many children, lunchtime is a fan favorite!



- Kane County Farm Bureau's new Prairie Pollinator Rain Garden and Little Lending Library are outreach and community service efforts to help educate the public about the importance of agriculture, farmers, farms and food, and about farmers efforts to protect the environment.

Chicken parmesan Casserole to warm the soul

Celebrate National Chicken Month with an easy and nutritious chicken meal for you, a neighbor, or friend or meal train family who may be in need. Serve now or freeze for later!

Ingredients

- 4 cups fully cooked chicken
- 1 jar of marinara sauce (28 oz)
- 1/2 cup shredded parmesan cheese
- 1 1/2 cups shredded mozzarella cheese
- 1 cup Panko or whole wheat bread crumbs
- 1-2 tablespoons olive oil
- 2-4 tablespoons of chopped fresh parsley (or 1 tbsp. dried)
- Salt & pepper to taste

Instructions

- Pre-heat oven to 350 degrees.
- In a greased 8x8 casserole dish, layer the fully-cooked

chicken in the bottom and dump in the marinara sauce and mix with the chicken. Next, top with both cheeses until all the chicken is covered.

In a small bowl, mix the breadcrumbs, olive oil, fresh herbs and a pinch of salt and pepper together.

Sprinkle the seasoned breadcrumbs over the top.

Bake for about 20-25 minutes or until golden on top and bubbling on the sides.

Freeze for Later: Follow steps 1-4 and then cover the casserole tightly with a few layers of foil, squeezing out as much air as possible. Label and freeze for up to 3 months.

Prepare from Freezer: Thaw in the fridge overnight and follow step 5.

THE STATE OF ILLINOIS POLLINATORS

I walk almost every day at a forest preserve near my home in Joliet, and over the years I've watched a small team of forest preserve employees and volunteers take back the prairie and woodlands from the neglected jumble of non-native, invasive plants that had overtaken the acreage.

They have worked painstakingly for years now, removing invasive and non-native plants and seeding and propagating native asters, vervain, baptisia, monarda, compass plant, wild senna and many more. It is a slow, laborious process changing the landscape and making it more productive for pollinators. The wildflowers have gradually become more robust and formed pockets and blankets of color

across the acres. The preserve is a welcoming haven for insects. I have seen something interesting with each summertime walk – black wasps, question mark butterflies, hummingbird clearing moths, clouded sulphur butterflies.

This year, however, I've been disappointed and alarmed by the lack of pollinators. I've seen very few butterflies – a few monarchs, tiger swallowtails, pearl crescents and cabbage whites. I've had very few pollinators in my yard as well, a space that is usually a tiny airport of fluttering butterflies, moths, hover flies, bees and bumblebees, feasting on the phlox, black-eyed susans, zinnias and dahlias.

It cannot be coincidence that hundreds of acres of farmland



around my home are for sale or sold, denuded of greenery, graded, groomed and prepared for houses, strip malls, fast food outlets and car washes

I learned on July 21st that the Union for Conservation of Nature placed the monarch on its list of threatened species and classified it as endangered. From what I've seen this year, many other species are equally compromised. They are running out of welcoming space and food sources.

Kane County Farm Bureau has made no small plans to welcome pollinators to our space on Randall Road. We put in a small pollinator garden three summers ago, but it has struggled, overwhelmed by rainwater runoff from the parking lot. KCFB sought new garden plans and remedies for this issue, and in early September, is installing a new, 60x100 ft., Illinois shaped Prairie Pollinator Rain Garden encompassing the old pollinator bed. The state will be full of plants suited to mesic soil, and those that thrive in wetlands, including coneflowers, monarda, sweet flag and iris. Stone paths will create the prominent Illinois rivers, the Mississippi, Illinois, Fox, and Kaskaskia among them, and will channel runoff

water through the garden. Signs will explain the plants and environment to those who choose to traverse our miniature state.

I hope the pollinators flock to this little piece of real estate, and turn it into a miniature

DuPage Airport west as they linger with the liatris and cruise through the culver's root. I hope our KCFB friends stop by to see the progress of our pollinator patch. I'll be rooting them all on as they do.

Among the property improvements at KCFB that took place in early August, contractor Scott Jesseman of Prairie Fence and Landscape of Sugar Grove planted 6 locust trees along the parkway separating KCFB from Costco. The trees were sourced by James Meutze of Poplar Farms 2 in Batavia. Each will bear a plaque recognizing the farmer-members of KCFB who have served as Illinois Farm Bureau directors, representing the interests of farmers in Northern Illinois, during that organization's (and our) 100+ year history. Those farmers include Henry McGough (1919-23); Jack Young (1969-78); John White Jr. (1973-93); Eldon Gould (1978-85); Michael Kenyon (2001-11); and Robert Gehrke (2011-15).

Agriculture cultivates better communities

“My life is one big volunteer commitment. LOL.”

That’s an accurate assessment. I inquired about a project of our FFA Alumni organization, and my aunt was fresh off two community events for separate volunteer groups that weekend. Mind you, this is after a week of watching grandkids, preparing meals for the farm crew and caring for aging parents. It seems appropriate to insert a cross-eyed, slightly stressed emoji

face to our message exchange. Her bank account didn’t reflect it, but she impacted many lives for the better and profited in satisfaction.

My aunt’s level of commitment to giving and volunteerism places her in an elite category of service and selflessness. But generally speaking, farmers and other agriculture professionals are among the most giving people I know, and their explanation for this servant attitude is about as simple as the desire to farm: It’s in their blood, and it’s the right thing to do.

Previous generations taught us to volunteer out of duty and necessity. In small towns like ours, volunteers even handle

firefighting and first-response medical care. Thanks to volunteers, our communities are safe, my kids have a 4-H fair and youth in our small town have soccer and summer baseball programs. Volunteers provide amenities in our parks and coordinate the town’s largest events. They share hours of their time, skills and resources to improve schools, churches, hospitals and non-profit groups for the betterment of our community. Rural areas lack paid staff to handle such life-impacting essentials.

Across Illinois, Farm Bureau families make impacts when they sponsor youth safety programs from bikes to farm equipment. Volunteers coordinate blood drives and health screen-

ings at their county Farm Bureau buildings. The same families give their time in the church kitchen for a community dinner. They organize the school carnival, decorate for the annual FFA banquet, and understand the commitment of running a quality food stand as a fundraiser.

Just before COVID, our community won the Governor’s Cup for exemplary volunteerism to build our small town’s playground. In a tremendous effort, volunteers raised \$150,000 in funds and physically built that two-story, barn-shaped playground using their farm-based skills and donated use of resources, from power tools to tractors.

At that same park, more than

100 local FFA and 4-H volunteers will gather this month to transform that space into an agritourism attraction with free admission for more than 20 activities – a bale climb, farm chore course, high-tech sprayer simulator, and farm animals among them. Local youth eagerly help organize and operate this annual agriculture festival, and seasoned volunteers find satisfaction knowing they have instilled an ethic of service in the next generation.

U of I Extension offers best gardening tips for fall season

As fall approaches, trees begin to change color, cold weather sweeps in, and garden prepping for winter begins.

A free three-part University of Illinois Extension online webinar series will help gardeners prepare for the cold months ahead. Four Seasons Gardening has inspired generations of gardeners. The fall workshops begin at 1:30 p.m. Sept. 14 and will include tips for garden tool maintenance from Extension horticulture educator Richard Hentschel.

Sharp, rust-free tools are easier on the body and make whatever task is at hand quicker to finish, says Hentschel. Make gardening less of a chore by maintaining your equipment.

Fall is a popular time to examine landscape trees. Illinois is home to hundreds of native and non-native tree species, but identifying them isn’t always easy. Leaves, bark, twigs, buds, flowers, boles, and fruit all help in identification. Sarah Vogel, Extension horticulture educator, will help homeowners recognize tree species, both natives and non-natives, based on the size, shape, and appearance, as well as cover the basic parts of trees. The webi-

nar begins at 1:30pm Oct. 19.

Tree root collar disorder affects many trees. A root collar is an important area of a tree where root tissue shifts to trunk tissue. Impacts to this part of the tree can have a variety of symptoms, from yellow foliage and early fall color to dieback in the upper canopy, and even tree death. Extension educator Ryan Pankau will explain how to

identify, prevent, and treat trees with root collar disorder during the final fall webinar at 1:30 p.m. Nov. 30.
