20th annual Shopping Spree update



IFB Young Leaders elect 2021 executive committee

Wayne Gehrke of Kane County has been elected the 2021 Chair of the Illinois Farm Bureau Young Leader Committee. Gehrke, who just finished his term as IFB Young Leader vice chairman, grows

pumpkins, hay, corn and soybeans with his family in northern Illinois.

In the year ahead, he sees continued challenges and opportunities for Young Leaders. "I think the biggest challenge that the Young Leader

program across the state will face is: How do we keep the interest of our membership throughout COVID?" Gehrke asked. "And what value can the Young Leader program bring to their memberships?"

But regardless of barriers this past year, Young Leaders did adapt some programs into virtual or digital formats for their recent annual meeting, including the discussion meet, committee elections and the Harvest for ALL fundraiser.

Gehrke also sees new potential opportunities for Young Leaders to engage with the incoming Biden administration. "We also have a new incoming administration in which we will certainly see new policies," noted Gehrke. "How will that affect the Young Leaders program? Will we have more opportunities to speak with legislators? And what will that look like?" In 2021, Gehrke is eagerly

looking forward to having in-person Young Leader Commeetings, mittee although he's not sure when that will be possible. Nonetheless, Gehrke is "honored" to be selected by his peers for this leadership position.

"You never know what a year is going to look like and what a year will bring is maybe the biggest lesson we've learned from this past year," reflected Gehrke. "I think I'll need to be willing to be adaptable this year as well."

Feeding the world-American farmers grow abundance

American farmers have increased corn yield considerably since the 1930s.

Through the mid-1930s, 26 bushels per acre was the average for corn yield.

American growers began adopting double-cross hybrid corn in the late 1930s. Within a few years, the improvement in grain yield was impressive about 0.8 bushels per acre per year through the mid-1950s.

A second boost to corn grain yield began in the mid-1950's in response to continued improvements in genetic yield potential and stress tolerance plus increased adoption of N fertilizer,

chemical pesticides, and agricultural mechanization. The annual rate of corn yield improvement more than doubled to about 1.9 bushels per acre per year and has continued at that steady rate ever since, sustained primarily by continued improvements in genetics and crop production technologies.

Corn yield in 2019 was 175 bushels per acre, according to the USDA National Ag Statistics Service.

Today, farmers use GPS to "map" fields and hone planting, fertilizer and pesticide application. Management of soil and planting benefits include:

• Accurate soil sampling,

data collection and analysis, enable variation of chemical applications and planting density to suit specific areas of the field.

 Precise field navigation reduces redundant applications and skipped areas, and enables maximum ground coverage.

• Giving the ability to work through low visibility field conditions such as rain, dust, fog and darkness, leading to increased productivity.

 Accurately monitored yield data enables future site-specific field preparation.

 An increase in spray efficiency and greatly reduced overspray.

Innovation grows on the farm

As infatuated as I am with old barns and windmills, I'm equally captivated by rows of young corn plants that don't overlap at the end rows, a pleasing visual credited to satellite technology and automatic planter row shutoffs. Photographs of our farm's old barns decorate walls of the farm office, where the top of a weathered windmill also backdrops my desk. The newest canvas print on the wall shows modern machines harvesting biotech crops near the solar panels that help power our grain drying and storage.

We fondly respect the farm's nostalgic qualities as well as the generations of innovation that have improved the farm and likewise the world. "Innovation grows here" and represents the topic of a new docuseries at the Illinois Farm Families web site WatchUsGrow.org. As a kid, my

grandpa remembers farming with horses to grow feed for his own livestock. He retired with hands-free, satellite-guided steering in a high-horsepower tractor to grow grain and oilseed for a global market.

Innovation on the farm leaps significantly one generation to the next, just as smartphones, online shopping, and Zoom have changed modern life. Satellite-guided machinery drives with greater accuracy than car navigation systems to precisely place seed and nutrients. Seed biotechnology produces more crops with fewer inputs and less environmental

impact. Farmers grow cleanerburning fuel from corn and soybeans, a local-grown, renewable resource producing more than 1.7 billion gallons of renewable biofuels in Illinois alone.

Modern livestock farmers tell me about smarter barns that automatically control air quality or customize feed rations based on scans of an animal's identification tag. At our grain storage facility, my brother controls grain drying and monitors grain temperature from his tablet. We can observe solar energy production from an app, watch market prices on the go, and receive alerts when hail potentially damages crops in a field miles away from the home farm.

Evolving farm practices that improve the bottom line often benefit the environment, a reason innovation will continue. Our farm planted more cover crops than ever in fall 2020. Ground cover of cereal rye, balansa clover and radish (the type to reduce soil compaction, not eat) grow in fields to control erosion and hold nutrients in place until we plant the next crop.

When our kids schooled remotely during harvest, we had plenty of cab time to talk technology and how their greatgrandparents farmed. The older ones learned to drive a tractor with a modern-day transmission, too. The experiences strengthen their respect for the farm, its history, and the innovation that helps fulfill our duty to leave the land better than we found it.

Members set policy during **IFB virtual Annual Meeting**

Illinois Farm Bureau successfully held its 106th Business Meeting in an entirely virtual format to conduct its annual business session and set policy for the upcoming year.

Traditionally, the IFB Annual Meeting is held at the historic Palmer House hotel in Chicago over a four-day period. Thousands of members, farmer delegates, staff members and spouses travel upstate for an extended weekend of policy debate, networking and celebration of the year's successes.

The event was taken entirely virtual - a first for the organization – in 2020.

"Pandemic mitigation meas-

ures made it clear early on that we would not be able to hold our annual meeting in the same capacity that our members look forward to," said IFB President Richard Guebert Jr. "While a live virtual event is not ideal for our business session, this is our best solution during circumstances that limit face-to-face gatherings, which we know our members prefer."

The meeting kicked off with the President's Address, in President which Guebert acknowledged the accomplishments of the organization during the trying times of the pandemic. "I'm proud of how Farm

Bureau shifted and adjusted to

continue serving our members," Guebert said.

Delegates voted on policy submittals virtually this year using an electronic balloting process. This action concluded prior to the start of the Saturday business meeting.

Due to the bulk of policy discussion taking place ahead of time, delegates were able to approve policy resolutions during the live business session and present the finalized 2021 policy book.

Voting delegates for the meeting, totaling 336, decided on policy surrounding small business liability, crop protection, requiring notifications from highway authority, and dairy policy. The language of these approved policies will be forwarded to American Farm Bureau Federation for consideration during their upcoming annual meeting.

A recommendation for the creation of a Livestock Working Group was also submitted to the IFB board of directors for consideration. This group would focus on recent pricing issues and price disparity seen within the livestock industry this year. "Each year our policy book receives a full review by our delegates, a process that starts months before the annual meeting," said Executive Director of Governmental Affairs and Commodities Mark Gebhards. "While we were not able to gather in person this year to debate policy changes in-person, we have adapted to make sure our members' voices are still heard." Approximately 880 IFB members and staff attended the meeting virtually. County awards and several annual awards were suspended this year.



before they could continue with rebuilding. It was a laborious process for a city that was still recovering from the bombing raids of WWII.

My siblings and I had a wonderful baby sitter, Mrs. Miller, who took good care of us when my parents were away. She was the widow of a British Army captain, and lived off of Sloane Square in a modest flat. She told us stories of life during wartime, with her husband away and air raids that shrieked her out of bed and into the Sloane Square tube station to spend the night in the train tunnels, not knowing what she would emerge to the next morning. It was a horrible hardship and literal nightmare for her and eight million fellow Londoners. She survived with a kind heart and generous spirit. Indomitable.

Fast forward to 2020.

I can't begin to calculate how many hours in 2020 went into developing not one, but five COVID-19 vaccines, the first of which rolled out in mid-December. What a daunting task to race the clock with an eye to the mounting toll of lives lost, and to explore the virus, find its

Private well testing program in February

The Kane County Farm Bureau and Kane/DuPage Soil and Water Conservation District are cooperating again to offer a water testing program in February 2020. A high quality water supply is vital for families, and this program helps provide peace of mind and identifies potential problem areas for homeowners of Kane

County. The program works sim-

ply as follows: Step 1. Monday, February 22 - Friday, March 5, 2021

Pick up water test kits from the Kane County Farm Bureau, 8:30am-4:30pm or from Kane/DuPage Soil and Water Conservation District, 8am - 4:30pm, M-F. Payment is due for each test kit upon pick-up.

Step 2. Sunday, March 7, 2021 Collect the water sample.

Step 3. Monday, March 8, 2021

Return water sample to Farm Bureau or Kane/DuPage Soil & Water Conservation District.

Costs vary for depending on which tests you have performed on your water. Three kits are available:



A. Basic Package (Nitrate Package) - \$45.00

Tests for nitrate, nitrite, ammonia, chloride, sulfate, soluble phosphorus, silica and specific conductivity.

B. Pesticide Screen – \$80.00

Indicates the presence of tri-

azine herbicides, Lasso, Dual or Harness.

C. Metals - \$95.00 Tests for 23 different metals.

More detailed sampling instructions will be included in each kit and additional information on how each test can help you is provided at the Farm Bureau or Kane/DuPage Soil and Water Conservation's District offices. Testing will be performed by Heidelburg College Water Quality Laboratory in Tiffin, Ohio, a certified lab that has been nationally recognized for its work in testing rivers and lakes, and results are mailed directly to your home. We are able to provide these deeply discounted testing fees because we are providing the laboratory a bulk number to be tested.

IDOA cover crop applications open

The Illinois Department of Agriculture (IDOA) is accepting online applications for the second state cover crop program.

The Fall Covers for Spring Savings Program applications are available at https://apps. agr.illinois.gov/BLWR Cover Crop/. Eligible acres will be funded on a first-come, firstserved basis and receive premium discount of \$5 per acre on

the following year's crop insurance invoice for every enrolled, certified cover crop acre.

Before applying, farmers must certify their cover crops were seeded in fall 2020 through their local Farm Service Agency (FSA) office with a current FSA-578 and include a federal crop insurance policy number with the application.


